AN ACT TO AMEND §67100, §67103, AND §67107 AND TO REPEAL § 67107.1 OF CHAPTER 67, TITLE 10, GUAM ANNOTATED. RELATIVE TO CODE THE **AFFAIRS** APPOINTMENT OF OFFICER AND MEMBERS OF THE GUAM VETERANS COMMISSION, THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE VETERANS AFFAIRS OFFICER, THE COMPOSITION **OPERATIONS GUAM** OF THE COMMISSION, AND THE DEFINITION OF A VETERAN.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- 3 that in 1970 P.L. 10-123 was enacted establishing the Guam Office of Veterans
- 4 Affairs (GOVA). In 2005, P.L. 28-46 was enacted establishing the Guam Veterans

1	Commission (Commission) to work collaboratively with the GOVA in meeting its
2	mandate to assist Guam's Veterans in the filing of compensation claims for service-
3	connected disabilities and other benefits available to eligible Veterans and their
4	families. The Commission has since evolved to be the Voice of the Veterans
5	community.
6	I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that GOVA and the Commission must
7	work collaboratively so that the needs voiced by the Veterans community can be
8	duly prioritized and effectively addressed.
9	Section 2. §67100 of Chapter 67, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is
10	amended to read as follows:
11	§ 67100. Creation of Office.
12	There is within the Office of I Maga'hågan/Maga'låhen Guåhan an Office of
13	Veterans Affairs. The Veterans Affairs Officer is the administrative head of the
14	Office of Veterans Affairs and is a member of the classified unclassified service,
15	appointed by I Maga'hågan/Maga'låhen Guåhan and is the administrative head of
16	the Office of Veterans Affairs subject to the with advice of the Guam Veterans
17	Commission. direction and control of I Maga 'hagan/Maga'lahen Guåhan, who is
18	the appointing authority.
19	Section 3. §67103 of Chapter 67, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated is
20	amended to read as follows:
21	§ 67103. Powers and Duties of Officer.
22	The Officer:
23	(a) shall administer the Office and implement the provisions set forth in
24	Section 67102 above;
25	(b) shall exercise and discharge the duties of the Office through such
26	organizational units as he may establish;

1	(c) shall enforce the provisions of this Chapter and of any other laws
2	granting him jurisdiction pertaining to veterans of the Armed Forces of the
3	United States;
4	(d) may administer and certify oaths and affirmations, take and certify
5	affidavits and acknowledgments, and exercise any other power of a notary
6	public, but only as part of his duties under this Chapter and neither he not
7	his office shall charge any fee for such certification or notarial service;
8	(e) may formulate and adopt rules necessary or proper for the internal
9	administration of the Office; and
10	(f) may study and plan for the establishment of a Guam Veterans
11	Cemetery, seeking such assistance, advice and support from the Armed
12	Forces of the United States, the Federal Veterans Administration, other local
13	and Federal agencies, and veterans and veterans organizations.
14	(g) Shall receive and consider execute the policy recommendations of the
15	Guam Veterans Commission to the extent said recommendations are not in
16	contravention to existing law or directives.
17	Section 4. §67107 of Chapter 67, Title 10, Guam Code
18	Annotated is amended to read as follows:
19	§ 67107. Guam Veterans Commission.
20	(a) Commission Membership. There is hereby established a Guam
21	Veterans Commission which shall, at a minimum, be composed of a
22	total of-nine six approved Veteran organizations whose representatives
23	to the Commission are Veterans members who have been nominated by
24	their respective organizations and approved by I Maga 'hågan/Maga 'låhen
25	Guåhan. The members to shall include, but not limited to, the following
26	representation:

1	(1) four <u>a</u> members, each of whom shall be representative of a
2	veterans or retirees association for each branch of the U.S. Armed
3	Forces to consist of:
4	(A) U.S. Army Retirees (or Veterans) Association;
5	(B) U.S. Marine Corps Air Force Retirees (or Veterans)
6	Association;
7	(C) U.S. Navy Retirees (or Veterans) Association;
8	(D) U.S. Air Force Marine Corps Retirees (or Veterans)
9	Association;
10	(E) U.S. Space Force
11	(F) U.S. Coast Guard;
12	(2) two a members from the officially chartered Guam chapters of
13	multi-service Veteran Service Organizations to include but not limited
14	to: the American Legion (AL), Military Order of the Purple Heart
15	(MOPH), Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), and the Vietnam Veterans
16	of America (VVA). Organizations to be represented on the Guam
17	Veterans Commission, pertaining to this subsection Subsections (1) and
18	(2), are required to be duly registered as a non-profit organization with
19	the Guam Department of Revenue and Taxation, in accordance with
20	Title 18 of Guam Code Annotated; and/or is registered as a non-profit
21	organization within the United States and recognized as exempt under
22	IRC 501(c)(19). The organizations shall furnish the Guam Veterans
23	Affairs Office (GOVA) with a copy of an official documentation
24	reflecting such requirement; and
25	(3) Approved Veteran Organizations. Organizations to be
26	represented on the Guam Veterans Commission, pertaining to
27	Subsections (1) and (2), are required to be duly registered as a non-

Taxation, in accordance with Title 18 of Guam Code Annotated; and/or is registered as a non-profit organization within the United States and recognized as exempt under IRC 501(c)(19), IRC 501 (4), or IRC 501(c)(3). The organizations shall furnish the Guam Veterans Affairs Office (GOVA) a copy of official documentation reflecting their non-profit status, a current certificate of Good Standing, and a copy of the organization's By-Laws. GOVA shall maintain a file of each organization represented on the Commission; and

(3) a maximum of three members, whom each shall be a veteran, may be appointed from other veteran organizations on Guam, to include the Coast Guard. Should a Veteran Service Organization have more than one Chapter, each Chapter may recommend a representative to serve as a member of the Commission, of which said appointment may be authorized to serve as provided herein.

(4)Ex-Officio Members. With the recommendation of the Guam Veterans Commission, *I Maga'hågan/Maga'låhen Guåhan* may appoint as an ex-officio, non-voting member a veteran of a foreign country who has fought alongside U.S. armed forces members as allies in combat, who is a representative of an established allied veterans organization on Guam which is compliant with §67107(a)(3), and is a resident of who has resided on Guam for a minimum of three years immediately preceding the appointment. Said veteran *shall* serve for a term of three years from the date of appointment.

- (b) Commission Membership Terms and Conduct of Business.
  - (1) Veteran Organization Nominations. Appointments. The

Commander, or designee, of <u>a</u> Veteran Service Organizations shall present in writing to the Chairman of the Commission the names of two the individuals, to be transmitted to <u>I Maga'hågan/Maga'låhen</u> <u>Guåhan</u> who shall for approval to the Commission to represent their respective veteran organization to serve on the Commission, which shall be subject to the aforementioned provisions above. The nominating Organization shall designate each nominee as the Primary and Alternate representative, respectively.

- (2) Terms of Commission <u>Representatives</u> <u>Members</u>. Every <u>representative</u> <u>member of to</u> the Commission *shall* serve for a term of three years, to commence on the date of <del>appointment</del> <u>approval by the</u> Governor.
  - (A) Should the <u>approved primary Commission</u> representative terminate his/her term prior to the conclusion of the three years, the <u>approved Alternate shall assume the Primary representative position</u>. In the event both approved representatives terminate, the <u>nominating Veteran Service Organization shall appoint nominate</u> a successor to serve for a new the balance of the three year term, which *shall* commence upon the date of <u>appointment</u> approval by the Governor.
  - (B) Said appointment nomination shall be in writing and presented to the Chairman of the Guam Veterans Commission for transmittal to *I Maga 'hågan/Maga 'låhen Guåhan*, with a copy to be furnished to the Veterans Affairs Officer of the Office of Veterans Affairs.
- (3) Quorum Requirements. The presence of fifty percent (50%) plus one of the appointed primary or alternate members shall be

required to establish quorum. For purposes of a quorum and for the official conduct of business, a minimum of five voting members on the Commission shall constitute a quorum. For the official conduct of business, a majority of the members present, following the constituting of a quorum, shall be required to conduct official business.

(4) Scheduled Meetings. The Commission shall meet at least once every quarter. However, nothing herein prevents the convening of additional meetings to deliberate on emergent issues. —monthly and shall advise the Veterans Affairs Officer regarding matters affecting Veterans and related issues. Said meeting times, place and dates shall be decided to allow the greatest level of participation and attendance by Commission members.

(5)Conduct of meetings. The Commission shall conduct its meetings in accordance with the Open Government Law, 5GCA Ch 8.

(6)Use of Video Teleconferencing. Commission members may participate in regular meetings via video teleconferencing and in accordance with 5GCA Ch 43 § 43121. Participation of a member via teleconferencing may be counted towards quorum requirements. The Commission shall broadcast regular meetings in accordance with 5GCA Ch 43 § 43122.

(7)Removal from Commission for Unexcused Absences. The unexcused absences of a member from three (3) consecutive regular meetings of the Commission shall constitute a cause for removal of the member from the Commission, I Maga'hågan/Maga'låhen Guåhan may thereupon remove the

member from the Commission. The determination of whether a member's absence is excused or unexcused shall be made by the Commission.

(8)(5) Veteran Community Participation. The Commission shall provide veterans and their families with the opportunity to air present grievances and concerns for the purpose of effecting corrective action or change to existing policies that affect the delivery of benefits and services to the Guam's Veteran population.

(9)(6)-Administrative Support. The Guam Veterans Office (VAO) through the direction of the VAO-Administrator Veterans Affairs Officer, shall provide administrative support to the Guam Veterans Commission in the conduct of its meetings.

(10) (7) Commission Activities. Upon official written request by the Chairman of the Commission for information or action by the VAO Administrator on issues affecting the Commission or Veterans, the VAO Administrator shall provide a written timely response to the Commission within four weeks by the next regularly scheduled Commission meeting, or sooner from the date of receipt of such communication. Should the VAO Administrator require additional time to provide a sufficient response to the matter, the VAO shall request in writing a time extension, not to exceed an additional four weeks, and further provide justification for the need for such time extension in said written communication. Such request shall be granted upon receipt by the Chairman of the Commission. Ethics Training. Commission representatives shall complete an ethics training within six months from the date of

2	Section 5. § 67107.1 of Chapter 67, Guam Code Annotated, is
3	hereby repealed in its entirety
4	§ 67107.1. New Membership Process.
5	The process for new membership to the Guam Veterans
6	Commission is as follows:
7	(a) The Guam Veterans Affairs Office shall receive new
8	membership requests and submit same
9	to the Chairman of the Guam Veterans Commission.
10	(b) The Veterans Commission shall review the new
11	membership request and forward its
12	recommendation to I Maga'hågan/Maga'låhen Guåhan for
13	appropriate action.
14	Section 6. Severability. If any provision of this Act or its application to any
15	person or circumstance is found to be invalid or inorganic, such invalidity shall not
16	affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect without
17	the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are
18	severable.
19	Section 7. Effective Date. This Act shall be effective upon enactment.
