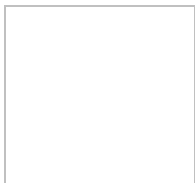

Dear Madam Chair and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of **Bill No. 110-38 (COR)**, introduced by Senator Eulogio Shawn Gumataotao, relative to codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission.

The Criminal Justice Automation Commission (CJAC) was established in 1993 to strengthen peace officer safety in Guam. During the late 1980s and early 1990s, the courts and the broader criminal justice system began to encounter increasingly complex caseloads, including more sophisticated crimes and growing demands for probation and rehabilitation services. Without reliable access to accurate, timely, and complete information, peace officers faced greater risks when responding to incidents in the field.

To meet these challenges, the Judiciary brought together key partners across the justice system—including the courts, the Legislature's committee on justice, and several criminal justice agencies—with support from the Bureau of Planning and the Department of Administration's data team. Together, we developed an automated infrastructure that improved access to critical records and reduced duplication among agencies. Early contributors included the Guam Police Department, the Office of the Attorney General, and the Department of Corrections, all of whom played a central role in supplying data and building the shared systems that CJAC would come to oversee.

Through this collaboration, the Judiciary of Guam became the island's designated Criminal Justice Systems Agency, a role it has carried out for more than thirty years. The Judiciary manages Guam's connection to the National Crime Information Center, oversees the submission of fingerprint records to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and maintains Guam's criminal history repository. This structure ensures that law enforcement has consistent, reliable access to essential information for investigations and officer safety.

The Judiciary of Guam is an equal opportunity provider and employer.

Today, the Judiciary continues to oversee these responsibilities and meets monthly through the Commission, which I currently co-chair with the Office of Technology. The Commission's membership still includes GPD, the OAG, and DOC—agencies that continue to contribute data and are now actively working to modernize their own case management systems. With these partners making significant technology investments, the time is ripe to strengthen the collaborative infrastructure that supports them. Bill 110 addresses this gap by securing the Commission's role as a permanent entity. Statutory recognition also strengthens compliance with Guam's Open Government Law by requiring public notice of meetings and reinforcing transparency and accountability across its activities. If the Commission is a statutorily created entity, then it is eligible to seek grants to enhance the criminal justice infrastructure.

Through the efforts of the Commission, information is shared among the Executive Branch law enforcement agencies and the Judiciary. The Judiciary's resources are used to support the administrative work of the Commission. In addition, the Judiciary provides personnel to the Guam Police Department to enter data into GPD's records management system. Our Management Information System and Marshals divisions also provide technical support. Since its inception, the Office of Technology has worked closely with the Judiciary to enhance the connection between the two branches to enhance the system of providing this critical information to law enforcement officers.

In short, Bill 110 honors the vision that led to the Commission's creation, acknowledges its contributions, and strengthens access to critical information across our law enforcement community. We thank the Legislature for moving this initiative forward and for your continued commitment to the administration of justice.

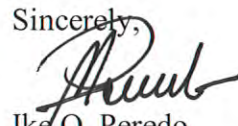

Hafa Adai Chairwoman Taitague and members of the 38th Guam Legislature.

My name is Theresa C. Arriola, Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS). Thank you for the opportunity to speak today on Bill 110-38 (COR) "*An act to add a new Chapter 16 to Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated, relative to codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission*" introduced by Senator Shawn Gumataotao.

DPHSS supports the intent of Bill 110. The Criminal Justice Automation Commission is a critical step forward in modernizing Guam's justice system. It formalizes collaboration among law enforcement, courts, prosecution, corrections, and social services to manage and share data effectively.

I would especially like to highlight this bill's impact on the Department of Public Health and Social Services, particularly the Division of Children's Wellness, Bureau of Social Services Administration (BOSSA), which includes Child Protective Services (CPS). CPS depends on timely access to information from the National Crime Information Center, or NCIC, especially during active investigations into child abuse and neglect. Accurate criminal justice data can make a critical difference between a child being safe or remaining in harm's way. This information is also essential for social workers investigating individuals with prior criminal histories. When necessary, they can coordinate with the Guam Police Department to conduct home visits, ensuring the safety of both the child and the responding workers.

By codifying the Commission, we ensure agencies like BOSSA can continue accessing the information they need through coordinated, legally supported systems. The focus is protecting vulnerable children, strengthening the frontline response, and enabling partnering agencies to work more efficiently.

Additionally, although not specifically mentioned, DPHSS would like the committee to consider utilizing this system access not only for CPS but for all child placement to include foster families. Foster families, also known as resource families, play a vital role in child placement when CPS or the natural parents are unable to identify kin placement. In these cases, emergency foster placement is needed and often the urgency of placement is reliant on a criminal history check component. Inclusion would support the rapid identification of safe placement for children in a CPS assessed and approved home.

Thank you again for this opportunity to testify in support of Bill 110-38.

As the island's single state entity that provides behavioral health services to all people on Guam, GBHWC recognizes the critical intersection between mental health and the justice system. Technological advancements in the criminal justice system must account for the unique needs of individuals, especially those experiencing mental health and substance use challenges. Many justice-involved individuals struggle with untreated mental health conditions.

The Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) has the potential to streamline access to care, improve coordination between behavioral health providers and the justice system, and reduce unnecessary barriers for those seeking treatment. We anticipate the CJIS will impact clients across numerous GBHWC programs including those individuals involved in the Mental Health Court, individuals in the Youth Correctional Facility and the Department of Corrections, sexual assault survivors served by our Healing Hearts Crisis Center, and individuals requiring Assisted Outpatient Treatment. The CJIS can aid in facilitating seamless communication between the courts and client's wraparound team, as well as ensure individuals receive timely assessments, appropriate interventions, and continuity of care.

Behavioral health and substance use treatment must not be an afterthought in automation efforts, but rather be considered essential to fostering a justice system that is not only efficient but also equitable and rehabilitative. We greatly appreciate the opportunity to serve on the Criminal Justice Automation Commission to ensure that mental health considerations are integrated into this initiative. We look forward to collaborating in the development of a system that prioritizes both public safety and the well-being of those impacted by the justice process.

The Bureau of Statistics and Plans (BSP) is pleased to provide testimony in support of Bill No. 110-38 (COR) "AN ACT TO ACT A NEW CHAPTER 16 TO TITLE 5 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO CODIFYING THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE AUTOMATION COMMISSION."

For over three decades, the Criminal Justice Automation Commission (CJAC) has played a pivotal role in advancing technology-driven solutions for Guam's Criminal Justice entities. It was formed in 1993 to guide the development and implementation of Guam's Criminal Justice Information System Plan. This plan served as the blueprint for the implementation of the criminal justice information technology for Guam's law enforcement entities. Its primary role is to ensure the accuracy, completeness, and timeliness of Guam's Criminal Justice Records System, supporting interagency coordination and public safety.

Formalizing CJAC legal status is critical to ensuring its continued function, stability, and ability to enhance public safety, efficiency, and transparency in Guam's criminal justice system. Without

clear statutory recognition, CJAC's funding, oversight, and policy direction remain vulnerable to administrative shifts. This bill solidifies its authority, allowing CJAC to secure dedicated funding and enable long-term automation initiatives to continue modernizing Guam's criminal justice infrastructure. Codifying CJAC establishes its legal authority and ensures standardized governance.

While the Bureau supports the intent of Bill No. 110-38, we offer the following recommendations:

- (1) Develop procedures aimed at ensuring data integrity, consistency and interoperability amongst all information technology system platforms. Implementing these procedures will facilitate seamless data sharing and strengthen security protocols among criminal justice agencies. Furthermore, the Commission should establish measures to ensure the regular implementation of technology updates, and robust cybersecurity measures. These actions are essential to maintaining a Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) that is secure, efficient, capable of safeguarding sensitive criminal justice data and meets all federal information technology requirements; and
- (2) Include a provision for the Commission to present an annual report to the Governor and Legislature highlighting the Commission's activities, challenges and accomplishments, and plans for an improved and integrated criminal justice information system across criminal justice agencies.

In conclusion, I extend my support for Bill No. 110-38 with consideration of these recommendations. Codifying CJAC will ensure a modern, secure and efficient criminal justice information system that will protect the interests of the people of Guam.

Dear Senator Gumataotao:

Thank you for your invitation to provide comment on the draft amended version of Bill No. 110-38 (COR).

The Judiciary of Guam supports the inclusion of an annual reporting requirement to promote transparency and accountability in the Commission's work. However, we recommend revising the language in §16102(g) to provide greater flexibility and avoid codifying requirements that may become outdated over time. As currently drafted, subsection (g) references specific cost items and agreements that may be revised, superseded, or replaced as technology and interagency coordination evolve. We believe that codifying such detailed references may inadvertently bind the Commission to report on terms that may no longer be relevant or reflect current needs.

We respectfully suggest the following alternative language:

“(g) Submit a written report no later than May 1st of each year to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* summarizing the Commission's activities, accomplishments, challenges, and plans to enhance interagency collaboration and improve the integration of Guam's criminal justice information systems. The report shall also include information regarding associated costs and interagency agreements related to criminal justice data-sharing infrastructure.”

The Judiciary has no other suggested changes to the draft amended version of Bill No. 110-38 (COR) and appreciates the opportunity to collaborate on this important work to strengthen Guam's criminal justice system.

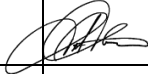

Bill No. 110-38 (COR) was introduced on Thursday, April 10, 2025, by Senator Eulogio Shawn Gumataotao. **Bill No. 110-38 (COR)**, and was referred by the Committee on Rules to the Committee on Economic Investment, Military Buildup, Regional Relations, Technology, Regulatory Affairs, Justice, Elections, and Retirement, on Friday, April 18, 2025. The Committee convened a Public Hearing on Thursday, May 8, 2025, at 2:00p.m. in the Guam Congress Building, Public Hearing Room.

II. SUMMARY OF TESTIMONY & DISCUSSION

The Public Hearing was Called-to-Order at 2:05pm. Bill No. 110-38 (COR – “AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 16 TO TITLE 5 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO CODIFYING THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE AUTOMATION COMMISSION.” was the only item on the agenda.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: *Bueñas yan háfa adai. Guahu si Senâdot* Telo Taitague. This Public Hearing is called to order and the time now is 2.05 p.m. Good afternoon to you all and to those who are watching at home and to those who are appearing before us, welcome to the people's house. For the record, today is Thursday, May 8, 2025. The hearing will be conducted by myself, senator Telo Taitague chairwoman of the committee on economic investment, military buildup, regional relations, technology, regulatory affairs, justice, election, and retirement. To comply with the open government law, notices of this hearing were disseminated to all senators and the public at large via email published in KUAM on Thursday, May 1, 2025.

A second notice was disseminated on May 6th, 2025. notice of this hearing was available on the Guam legislative website and the Government of Guam Public Notice Portal. I would like to welcome my colleagues who are here joining us today, Senator Gumataotao, thank you, sir, and Senator Sabrina Salas-Matanane, thank you, ma'am. We have the following bill on the agenda, which is only one today, and it's Bill No. 110-38 (COR). Before we discuss this bill, I want to set some rules of engagement for everyone to follow during the proceedings. I respectfully ask that we conduct ourselves professionally, respect each other's opinions. When asked to speak, please speak directly into the microphone.

So, I'll introduce the bill. It's bill 110-38 (COR), introduced by Senator Shawn Gumataotao, “AN ACT TO ADD A NEW CHAPTER 16 TO TITLE 5 OF THE GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO CODIFYING THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE AUTOMATION COMMISSION,” This



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bill received a fiscal note on April 18, 2025. Legal counsel had reviewed this legislation and has no recommended changes or amendments at this time. We invited several agencies to be here to testify. Those were the Supreme Court of Guam, Judiciary of Guam, Office of the Attorney General, Public Defenders Service Corporation, Department of Correction, Guam Police Department, Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, Bureau of Statistics and Plans, Guam Behavioral, Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, Department of Agriculture, Department of Public Health And Social Services, Department Of Parks And Rec, Department Of Youth Affairs, Department Of Revenue And Taxation, Guam Homeland Security and the Office of Civil Defense, Guam Homeland Security and The Office Of Civil Defense, A.B. Won Pat International Airport Authority, Mariana Regional Fusion Center, and Port Authority Of Guam. At this time, I'd like to turn over the microphone to my colleague, Senator Gumataotao, the author of this legislation. You are recognized, Sir.

SENATOR SHAWN GUMATAOTAO: Thank you very much Madam Chair for this Public Hearing on Bill 110-38 (COR) and for the opportunity, Madam Chair, to briefly introduce the measure which was requested for and drafted by the Judiciary of Guam. I am very familiar with the measure and I know that this effort has and will continue to contribute to the growth of our criminal justice system now and into the foreseeable future. Established in 1993, the Criminal Justice Automation Commission laid the groundwork in the development of a technical infrastructure that has greatly improved access to critical criminal justice records for Guam's law enforcement agencies. Since the creation of this Commission, Madam Chair, the Judiciary of Guam has worked closely with all executive branch criminal justice entities and related federal law enforcement partners to ensure that all the data needed to support their respective public safety roles are developed, collected, stored, and shared.

Madam Chair, led by the Judiciary of Guam, the CJAC has guided, among other things, improvements to the court's case management system, the criminal justice information system, the island-wide fingerprinting system, the technology that's inside most of, if not all, Guam's police vehicles that link these critical systems together and a host of other improvements to support the law enforcement needs of our local public safety agencies and our related federal partners. If approved, Bill 110-38 (COR) will, among other things, formally create the CJAC and set the Commission leadership and its membership. For the benefit of the listening audience, the CJAC membership will include the Chief Justice of Guam or his Or her designee, the Chief Technology Officer of the Executive Branch of the Government Of Guam, the Director of Bureau of Statistics And Plans, the Director of the Department of

Agriculture, the Director of the Department of Corrections, the Director of the Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency, the Department of Parks And Recreation, the Department of Public Health And Social Services- Division of Children's Wellness, the Director of The Department of Revenue and Taxation, the Director of the Department of Youth Affairs, the Director of the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center, the Administrator of the Office of Civil Defense, the Executive Manager of the Guam International Airport Authority, the Chief of the Guam Police Department, the Mariana Regional Fusion Center, the Attorney General of Guam, the General Manager of the Port Authority of Guam and finally, the Guam Legislature's Committee on Public Safety or a Legislative Committee with similar oversight.

According to Bill 110-38, the CJAC will meet quarterly and develop and maintain a process to determine if and how changes to existing criminal justice applications will impact Guam's Criminal Justice Information System. For the record Madam Chair, the Commission currently meets regularly on a quarterly basis. Madam Chair, for 32 years the Judicial branch has led this important government-wide effort to develop and maintain the Criminal Justice Information Systems needed to enforce all the laws of Guam. I have seen the work of the Commission firsthand as a former director of policy planning and community relations for our sister branch; their work has certainly evolved over three decades and today remains an important central repository to disseminate and store data shared by our local and federal criminal justice and law enforcement entities. With Bill 110-38 (COR), we as senators have a great opportunity

to ensure that through public law, the Criminal Justice Automation Commission and its continued operation will provide this important government Commission spanning all three branches of our government with the stability that it requires and deserves as a permanent entity. Madam Chair, I look forward to the presentations today and to working closely with you and your committee, and all the relevant stakeholders, especially many in this room today, to move Bill 110-38 (COR) forward. Thank you very much, Madam Chair.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: You're very welcome, Senator Gumataotao. At this time, we would like to invite Judge Katherine Maraman to come to the table, Joseph Leon Guerrero from Judicial as well. Are you going to be doing oral testimony? Okay, please, Joseph, if you can come too. Joey Terlaje, please come to the table. Lola Leon Guerrero from BSP, please come to the table. I don't see him, but... oh, is Antone Aguon from DOC are you going to be providing oral or written? You got it. Okay, so you can read it into the record please have a seat. Theresa Arriola, please come forward. We also have, well, I guess, Theresa, you'll be presenting your testimony. So, Patricia Mafnas will not be and neither will Heidi Quinata, right? Okay. Robert Rabago, will you be? No? Okay, but thank you for being here. I think we have everyone so far. Am I missing anyone that might be out



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there that's here to have oral testimony? Anyone? Okay so we'll go ahead and get started. Judge Maraman, you are recognized. Please state your name and title for the record and just move up your mic just a little bit more. If you can, put it on this side and then read your testimony.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: Good afternoon, Madam Chair, Senator Gumataotao, Senator Matanane. My name is Katherine Maraman. I'm an Associate Justice of the Guam Supreme Court, and I'm Chair currently of the Criminal Justice Automation Commission. I see members here from the court staff who can answer any questions the committee may have as well as members of the current Commission.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of this bill introduced by Senator Shawn Gumataotao relative to permanentizing the Criminal Justice Automation Commission. As the Senator mentioned, the Criminal Justice Automation Commission was established in 1993 to strengthen peace officer safety in Guam. During the late 1980s and early 1990s, the courts and the broader criminal justice system began to encounter increasingly complex caseloads, including more sophisticated crimes and growing demands for probation and rehabilitation services. Without reliable access to accurate, timely, and complete information, peace officers face greater risks when responding to incidents in the field.

To meet these challenges, the Judiciary brought together key partners across the justice system, including the courts, the legislature's Committee on Justice, and several criminal justice agencies with support from the then Bureau of Planning and the Department of Administration's data team. Together we developed an automated infrastructure that improved access to critical records and reduced duplication among agencies. Earlier contributors included the Guam Police Department, the Office of the Attorney General, and the Department of Corrections, all of whom played a central role in supplying data and building the shared systems that CJAC would come to oversee. Through this collaboration, the Judiciary of Guam became the island's designated criminal justice systems agency, a role that has carried out for more than 30 years. The Judiciary manages Guam's connection to the NCIC, oversees the submission of fingerprint records to the federal bureau of investigation, and maintains Guam Criminal Justice History Repository. This structure ensures that law enforcement has consistent, reliable access to essential information for investigations and officer safety. Today, the Judiciary continues to oversee these responsibilities and meets monthly through the Commission, which I currently co-chair with the office of technology, Mr.

Frank Lujan. The Commission's membership, which includes GPD, OAG, and DOC. Agencies that continue to contribute data, and are now actively seeking and working to modernize their own case management systems. With these partners making significant technology investment, the time is right to strengthen the collaborative infrastructure that supports them. Bill 110 addresses this gap by securing the Commission's role as a permanent entity. Statutory recognition also strengthens compliance with Guam's Open Government Law by requiring public notice of meetings and reinforcing transparency and accountability across its activities.

If the Commission is a statutorily created entity, then it is eligible to seek grants to enhance further the criminal justice infrastructure. Through the efforts of the Commission, information is shared among the Executive Branch law enforcement agencies and the Judiciary. The Judiciary's resources are used to support the administrative work of the Commission. In addition, the Judiciary provides personnel to the Guam Police Department to enter data into GPD's records management system. Our Management Information System and Marshall's divisions also provide technical support. Since its inception, the Office of Technology has worked closely with the Judiciary to enhance the connection between the two branches to enhance the system of providing this critical information to law enforcement officers. In short, Bill 110 honors the vision that led to the Commission's creation, acknowledges its contributions, and strengthens access to critical information across our law enforcement community. We thank the Legislature for moving this initiative forward and for your continued commitment to the administration of justice. Thank you.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: *Si Yu'os ma'åse'* Associate Justice Maraman and we'll stay with the courts at this time. Joseph Leon Guerrero you're recognized.

COLONEL JOSEPH LEON GUERRERO, DEPUTY CHIEF MARSHAL, JUDICIARY OF GUAM: *Håfa adai*, Madam Chair Taitague, Senator Gumataotao, Senator Salas-Matanane. I am here in support of Bill no. 110-38 (COR). I am Colonel Joseph J. Leon Guerrero, the Deputy Chief Marshal for the Judiciary of Guam Marshal's Office. I have been with the Judiciary for over 33 years and have been part of the criminal justice automation Commission, specifically working behind the scenes since 1999. In my collateral role as the FBI CJ systems officer for Guam, I have had the privilege of working with all local and federal law enforcement agencies on the island, training, certifying, and preparing them to utilize automated tools available for law enforcement purposes only. Whether it is VCCH or NCIC, the tools are vital to an officer's ability to be informed. Comparatively speaking, imagine each law enforcement agency having to avoid a disparity of force when combating an active shooter situation and how the law enforcement agency will equip its officers with the best equipment on the market today.



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The automated processes of our criminal history records require that same sense of urgency. The Commission, as outlined in this proposed legislation, will have the ability and the authority to discuss, deliberate, and provide the best courses of action necessary to update our criminal justice agencies with the latest and greatest technology needed for the safety and security of our island community. Imagine an automated law enforcement system consolidating rap sheets and providing the officers with complete, timely, and accurate data to make informed decisions. How do we determine if an individual here on the island or from another state is wanted by law enforcement, has a protection order, or even determine if the individual is a sex offender? Why do we have to imagine when that technology is already here? The NCIC or VCCH today have accomplished that requirement to all law enforcement communities in the past, present and definitely into the future. Regrettably, without a formal Commission, there are no controls to maintain accountability. Thankfully, with the efforts of our Chair, Senator Gumataotao, Bill 110-38 (COR) I am confident that there is hope. Thank you.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: You're very welcome, sir and at this time, Joey Terlaje, you are recognized.

JOEY TERLAJE, CHIEF OF PARK POLICE, DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION: *Buenas yan hãfa adai todus hamyu. Un dangkulu na Si Yu'os ma'ãse' ta'lo.* Again, my name is Joey Terlaje. I work for the Department of Parks and Recreation. I'm currently the Park Police Chief for DPR. I am here in strong support of Bill Number 110-38 (COR), an Act to Chapter 16 to Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission. This legislation represents a significant step forward in enhancing our criminal justice system by establishing a dedicated Commission to oversee and implement automation initiatives. The automation of the criminal justice processes is essential in today's digital age, providing the means to streamline operations, improve data sharing, and ensure the timely and accurate exchange of critical information. The formation of the Criminal Justice Automation Commission will benefit not only the law enforcement agencies, but also the community as a whole.

By facilitating better coordination and communication among various criminal justice entities we can enhance public safety and communication, enhance public safety, excuse me, reduce redundancies and promote transparency and accountability within the system. Moreover, the Commission's efforts will support the modernization of all criminal justice infrastructure,

making it more efficient, effective and responsive to the needs of our community. This initiative aligns with our ongoing efforts to improve public safety and uphold justice for all of our residents. Therefore, I'm respectfully requesting your most favorable support to pass bill 110-38 (COR) and bring this important vision to fruition. Together, we can create a more secure, efficient, and fair criminal justice system that benefits everybody. *Si Yu'os ma'åse*, thank you.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: You're very welcome, Mr. Terlaje. I was going to say Senator Terlaje.

JOEY TERLAJE, CHIEF OF PARK POLICE, DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION: Thank you.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, thank you so much for being here today. Next, I'd like to recognize Lola Leon Guerrero from BSP.

LOLA LEON GUERRERO, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF STATISTICS & PLANS (BSP): *Hafa adai* Senator Taitague, Senator Gumataotao, Senator Matanane. My name is Lola Leon Guerrero. I'm the Director of the Bureau of Statistics and Plans. And just to share some background information, I actually was directly involved in this program when it first started because there was a federal grant requirement where we had to set aside 5% of our Edward Byrne State and Local Law Enforcement Formula Grant program to establish criminal history records. So, I'm pleased to provide testimony in strong support of Bill Number 110-38, *An Act to add a new Chapter 16 to Title 5 to the Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission*. For over three decades, the Criminal Justice Automation Commission, CJAC, has been instrumental in advancing technology-driven solutions for Guam's criminal justice system. Established in 1993, CJAC has guided the development and implementation of the Criminal Justice Information System plan. This plan serves as a foundation for Guam's law enforcement technology infrastructure. Its role is vital in ensuring the accuracy, completeness, and timeliness of criminal justice. Its role is vital in ensuring the accuracy, completeness, and timeliness of criminal justice records while promoting interagency coordination and public safety.

Formalizing CJAC legal status is critical to its continued function and stability. Without clear statutory recognition, CJAC funding oversight and policy direction remain vulnerable to administrative shifts. Without clear statutory recognition, CJACs funding oversight and policy direction remain vulnerable to administrative shifts. This bill reinforces its authority, secures dedicated funding, and enables long-term automation initiatives to modernize Guam's criminal justice infrastructure. Codifying CJAC ensures standardized governance and strengthens accountability. The Bureau fully supports the intent of the bill. However, I have



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two recommendations to consider to enhance the effectiveness of this bill. Establish procedures to ensure consistency, security, and seamless integration across all criminal justice technology platforms. This regular update and enhanced cybersecurity measures will ensure the safeguard of sensitive criminal justice data and maintain compliance with federal standards.

The other provision is to require the Commission to present an annual report to the Governor and the Legislature detailing its activities, challenges, accomplishments, and initiatives to enhance the criminal justice automation. This will ensure transparency and allow stakeholders to access this progress. What this will also do is to also inform the legislature too should there, because funding is going to be needed for this. There are federal resources, but I know there are challenges with the federal resources, so we do need to explore opportunities to help to sustain the system beyond that. In conclusion, codifying CJAC will strengthen Guam's Criminal Justice Information System, enhancing efficiency, security, and interagency coordination for the benefits of the people of Guam. So, I thank you, and I hope we see this move forward. Thank you.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Thank you so much, Lola. At this time, I'd like to recognize the Director of the Department of Public Health and Social Services. Mrs. Arriola, you are recognized.

THERESA ARRIOLA, DIRECTOR, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES (DPHSS): *Hafa adai*, Chairman Taitague, Senator Shawn Gumataotao, Senator Sabrina Salas-Matanane. My name is Theresa Arriola, Director of Public Health and social services. Thank you for the opportunity to speak today on Bill 110-38 (COR), *An Act to add a New Chapter 16 to Title 5 to the Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission*, introduced by Senator Shawn Gumataotao. DPHSS supports the intent of Bill 110. The Criminal Justice Automation Commission is a critical step forward in modernizing Guam's justice system. It formalizes collaboration among law enforcement, courts, prosecution, corrections, and social services to manage and share data effectively. I would especially like to highlight this bill's impact on the Department of Public Health and Social Services, particularly the Division of Children's Wellness, the Bureau of Social Services Administration, commonly known as BOSSA, which includes Child Protective Services, CPS. CPS depends on timely access to information from the National Crime Information Center, or NCIC, especially during active investigations into child abuse and neglect. Accurate criminal

justice data can make a critical difference between a child being safe or remaining in harm's way.

This information is also essential for social workers investigating individuals with prior criminal histories. When necessary, they can coordinate with the Guam Police Department to conduct home visits, ensuring the safety of both the child and the responding workers. By codifying the Commission, we ensure agencies like BOSSA can continue assessing the information they need through coordinated, legally supported systems. The focus is protecting vulnerable children, strengthening the frontline response, and enabling partnering agencies to work more efficiently. Additionally, although not specifically mentioned, DPHSS would like the committee to consider utilizing the system access not only for CPS but for all child placement to include foster families. Foster families, also known as resource families, play a vital role in child placement with CPS or the natural parents are unable to identify kin placement. In these cases, emergency foster placement is needed, and often the urgency of placement is reliant on the criminal history check component. Inclusion will support the rapid identification of safe placement for children in a CPS assessed and approved home. Thank you again for this opportunity to testify in support of Bill 110-38. Respectfully, Theresa Arriola.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Thank you so much, Director. And I believe we have one more with Antone Aguon from DOC. You are recognized, sir.

MAJOR ANTONE AGUON, ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT, DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS (DOC): Good afternoon, senators. Senator Taitague, Gumataotao, and Matanane. I'm Major Antone F. Aguon from the Department of Corrections. I'm a Corrections Facility Assistant Superintendent. I'm here today on behalf of Director of Corrections, Fred Eugene Bordallo, Jr. He can't make it, so he has prepared a written testimony that I will read into the record. These are his words, so I will read it into the record on his behalf. Okay. Again, good afternoon. I added that one though.

Buenas yan Hafa adai, [Senator Telo Taitague, Senator Gumataotao, and Senator Matanane], I am providing testimony in support of the 38th Guam legislature Bill 110-38 (COR) proffered by Senator Gumataotao, that provides provisions in law to, add a New Chapter 16 to Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission. We agree, as this legislature indicates, that it is in the best interests of the people of Guam that criminal justice agencies and the Judiciary of Guam have access to accurate and current criminal justice information through an efficient criminal justice information system. The modernization efforts of the Department of Corrections have included significant financial investments in our computer information system technology with a new jail-based management system and a parole supervision system that is active and vital for Guam's criminal justice system. It is expected that with the establishment by law of a Criminal Justice Automation Commission, there will be



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coordination among Guam's criminal justice agencies to review and exchange information that leads to the sustainment and development of the criminal justice system and data needed for both policy use and computer system information technology improvement.

Thank you, Fred Eugene Bordallo, Jr., Director of Corrections.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: *Si Yu'os ma'åse* and at this time, I would like to have the author of the legislation start off with comments and any questions that he may have.

SENATOR SHAWN GUMATAOTAO: Madam Chair, I'm hoping I can wrap it up, if that's okay. Can I end the questions?

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Oh, sure, sure. Absolutely. So, Senator Matanane, you're recognized for any questions or comments.

SENATOR SABRINA SALAS-MATANANE: I don't have any questions, but I do support this bill, and it seems like it's a long time coming. Thirty years is a long time, and who better to know than the former Director. So, thank you.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: You're very welcome. I do have some questions to ask. I know that we talked about this at the beginning in January when I had an opportunity to meet with the Judicial branch on this system, and that it is, you're right, a long time coming. It's actually been in existence for quite some time with only three agencies overseeing this. Now that including 13 all together now, it's a larger group. So, I guess my question is, as the current Chair, Associate Justice Maraman, where do you currently meet with the Commission, with only three that you have?

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: Actually, we have about 10 to 20 that regularly attend the meetings.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: And then it's going to grow according to this bill now that you are codifying.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: The bill includes some of the agencies. For example, Parks and Rec, and is being connected into the system now. The Department of Corrections regularly attends our meetings, as does Mr. Lujan. the Bureau represents, sends a representative, and our meetings are on zoom.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Are on Zoom? Well, that takes care of a facility paying rent or anything like that. So that's good, that's good to hear.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: The members prefer to tune in and drive to the court, look for parking, and go upstairs.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Exactly.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: So that's worked out very well the last couple of years.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: We're finding out more people are attending if it's on Zoom. You get more of an attendance than anything else. So, it definitely saves us money too in that perspective. And that's what it will continue to do is be on Zoom? Okay, according to the FY26 Budget narrative, the Judiciary receives dedicated funding streams from DOC, GPD, and OAG, the Office of the Attorney General's office, to support the development of this CJIS program administered, I believe by the Marshals- the ones that have been administering this division. So, with more agencies now being part of the program, the CJIS or it's actually named something else because CJIS as a system, we're talking about, The CJAC, right? Okay, because the system is a system, but the CJAC- are they going to be contributing funding to this agency? Like how much have those agencies who are involved right now, DOC, GPD, and OAG how much have they been contributing?

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: There is a set cost every year, and what the agencies do is share the cost. I think this year it was...

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: About \$348,818 is that about right? Sure, go ahead. and please state your name for the record and your title.

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: Good afternoon, everyone. Danielle Rosetti, Administrator of the Courts for the Guam Judiciary. The Judiciary has entered into a contract with the vendor DataMax, and they are the vendor that we work with to support the solutions for the VCCH which we call the virtual computer computerized criminal histories solution, and then the National Criminal Information System, which is NCIC. So, the contributing agencies, as we submitted in our FY26 budget and as the



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legislature has been funding, I think currently for FY25 it was about \$368,000 divided across the four agencies relative to supporting those solutions. We similarly submitted the same request for the FY26 budget.

But, as far as the question as to whether the other members will contribute, there was, outside of whatever grant funding for FY25 we were able to get, I think \$77,000 in grant funding that we applied towards that cost. So, that we reduce the allocation for contributing agencies, and then for FY26, I think we've not made that determination as to what that cost is going to be, if the Commission is going to have the other agencies contribute. But we are in the midst of upgrading and enhancing the solution. And so, on average I think the cost, the annual cost of supporting the VCCH, the NCIC and NLETS which I don't want to confuse you with, then is a little over \$400K with the vendor that we have currently.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: So, it says here that DOC is already part of it, but now Parks and Rec is to be a part of it. If I have this right, it's going to be about \$364,000 a year to operate the CJIS, the system, right?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: So, if I can be clear, the agencies that actually contribute are agencies that provide data. So, for example, the Guam Police Department, they have an interface solution to our VCCH. So, the data is being pulled from the Guam Police Department arrest record, going into the server that hosts the information that is available to Parks and Rec, that is available to the other agencies. The Department of Corrections, they contribute- their data is being populated into the system. The Judiciary of Guam, we contribute a cost because it's our court criminal disposition data that is tied into the system. And then with the Office of the Attorney General, it's their decision whether to prosecute or not that is tied into the system. And so, everybody else that is kind of like part of the external membership, I guess, as we have seen, like the airport, they don't contribute data but they have access to it because they're law enforcement. They can see the criminal history record of an individual. So, the agencies that have been contributing- they have existing solutions and interfaces that are tied to VCCH, and they also have access to NCIC, and then they contribute to NLETS, which is another system.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. It's obviously a great mechanism for all our public safety agencies to be able to grab this data and you know cross-

check with all the other agencies. It's a perfect system that's set up. But my question, again, is how much is the funding to fund this system annually?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: So, in our FY26 budget submission, I think we put in a request of \$458,000.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, that's a little bit more than \$364,000 from the prior year, correct?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: Because of the grant funding, we didn't have the grant funding to secure.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: So, you lost grant funding this year?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: Right, there's no [funding] to cover some of the other subscriptions that are required for the system.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay so last year it was \$364,000, however, was most of that was from grant funding or all of it?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: Local appropriation, the Legislature appropriated local funding for each of the contributing agencies.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Right, contributing, which is three and now you're looking at adding all these other agencies contributing to the data and information. Would they have access to be able to go into the system if they needed to, like Parks and Rec, if they needed to find some information, cross-check with a certain somebody or fingerprints or something that they're trying to do their report on? Can they go into the system or do they have to access it through the Judicial?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: No, so law enforcement can have access to VCCH and NCIC.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, so would you recommend...

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: They're not putting data other than the four contributing agencies, they're not putting data into the system.



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SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Right, but they have access to that data.

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY:
Correct.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, so my question is, do you recommend that this be split 13 ways to cover the \$458,000 that you anticipate to run the system?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: I think perhaps I would like to defer that to the Commission and, you know, when we had the discussion about the appropriated funding from each of the respective agencies, it was a collaborative decision that was made to say we need to be able to help support the system, no more grant funding is going to be available over the years. But I think that's a conversation with perhaps that the Commission- the ones that have been meeting. I would defer to them.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE: I think that's actually a policy decision the legislature made. They decided that this was the cost.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: And that's how much is going to happen. The grant that was helping support the system last year that you had, did it come from BSP? Is this part of the BSP grant that you provide funding to judicial under the Byrnes or some of the other grants?

LOLA LEON GUERRERO, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF STATISTICS & PLANS (BSP): So, I do know with regards to the four costs that is divided by the Courts, DOC, AG and GPD, that is locally appropriated over the years. So, grant funds cannot be used to cover that. The [Edward] Byrne grant funds were not used to cover that cost. So, there must have been another funding source that was used to offset that.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Can you tell me what grant you received?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: It was, we utilized grant funding from NCHIP, but that was to pay for the upgraded annual subscription that supports the system.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: It's called what?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: NCHIP chip- National Criminal History Information Program.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay.

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: Improvement program. [National Criminal History Improvement Program]. There you go.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: But it's no longer in existence. Hopefully it'll come back to kind of help the other agencies because it sounds to me like this funding is going to probably be spread equally amongst everyone who utilizes the system, which by far is needed. I looked at even other jurisdictions that have this. They absolutely do, not just in the United States, but places like London, England. They actually have this system placed in Malaysia as well. So, it's definitely needed. I mean, we need to stay up to date. The other questions I have with regards to... Does the current CJIS utilize AI to enhance the system at all? And if so, what are the safeguards to protect against misuse, bias, and discrimination in the system and to ensure transparency? Are there guidelines that have already been implemented with the system you have now?

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: I'm not technical, so I don't know if AI is involved, but I do know that the data we have, for the most part, is public information, and it's just developing a system to easily access and share that information. So, I can't imagine that there's an issue about gender bias or any of those things. It's just sort of so and so was arrested and charged with and then what happened after the charge.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Well, it's nice that your co-sponsor is the office of technology. They can provide some of that information and put in store some of the rules or guidelines at least, especially as we're seeing it.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: I do know the Chief Justice and Mr. Lujan and Danielle attended a cybersecurity seminar earlier this year, and they're working together to promote the safety of our infrastructure.



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SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. Some of the testimony that we received are from other agencies who are not able to get to be here today, but they did provide it. Guam Homeland Security also recommended in their testimony to include language that requires CJAC to adopt and implement National Security standards for Criminal Justice Information Systems, such as those established by the FBI's Criminal Justice Information Service Division. And BSP also recommended procedures to ensure data integrity, consistency, and amongst other information technology system platforms, et cetera. So, are the National Security Standards currently implemented?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: If I may, and I don't know if Colonel Leon Guerrero might want to add to this, but we do already currently have an FBI Security Policy that we work closely with the FBI on. So, our systems have all these firewalls in place to ensure that we're complying with the FBI security policy by the same token the vendor that we work with DataMax is also in compliance with FBI security policies. So, we have pretty good firewalls in place- our IT or MIS division. We have an ASO there that is a dedicated employee that is also on the technical side with the FBI. We provide that information and, you know, there's a lot that we undertake to ensure that the servers that host the information and all the data that's coming in is in compliance with the FBI Security Policy as well as any firewalls that need to be in place for any potential cyber-attacks.

COLONEL JOSEPH LEON GUERRERO, JUDICIARY OF GUAM: Madam Chair ...

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Yes, please, Joseph.

COLONEL JOSEPH LEON GUERRERO, JUDICIARY OF GUAM: ... so just to add on to that, basically the FBI CJIS Security Policy is the bible. And so, we kind of follow... there is rigorous requirements that the FBI provides that we follow. In addition to that, what normally happens from an FBI CJIS perspective is that we're audited every three years. And so, from those confines of that audit, they literally go into the system, determine if there's any vulnerabilities and what not, if it's not in line with the FBI security policy. And so, your question with the national standards, the answer is, yes and at the same time, we are getting audited. In fact, this year was our audit cycle and we pretty much passed moving forward.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: So, on that line of auditing information that's retrieved from the system, it's very confidential. Are there any guidelines on who has

access? Because right now we have 13 individuals who now will be a part of this Commission and each one of them will have the ability to pull information that could be very sensitive. So, how do you go about that.

COLONEL JOSEPH LEON GUERRERO, JUDICIARY OF GUAM: Correct. And so, with the legislation, the agencies like Public Health with BOSSA, Port Authority- as long as there's a nexus to law enforcement, that agency is involved with this whole process, because the information is strictly for law enforcement. But to allow the non-criminal side, there's also options available, which is also inclusive, i.e. the Compact Counsel within the FBI that allows specific requirements for these non-crimes.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: And that hence is Public Health?

COLONEL JOSEPH LEON GUERRERO, JUDICIARY OF GUAM: Correct. Correct.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: ... and the BSP as well. So those are the two entities that are ... Go ahead, BSP.

LOLA LEON GUERRERO, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF STATISTICS & PLANS (BSP): No, BSP will not be accessing the system. We're just a member, and it's more because there were some funding guidelines that we needed to comply with. So, we have a plan and there's a grant, so there's funding opportunities like for example we provided funding to DOC so that DOC can update and implement their system. So, over the years, Bryne JAC funding has been utilized to basically implement the systems at the four law enforcement entities. However, over the years, technology has changed, and those systems now become, I guess, no longer good, and they end up upgrading the systems.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: So, Lola, you wouldn't feel so bad if you're not part of this group at all, would you?

LOLA LEON GUERRERO, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF STATISTICS & PLANS (BSP): So, I'm just going to read up something of the history of the Criminal Justice Records Improvement, of kind of how it all started. Unless I can provide you with information, maybe I can email it to you because it was really started because there was federal funding and we had to set aside 5% of our grant. And, one of the requirements was we needed to establish a Criminal Justice Records Improvement Plan for the government of Guam, for the island, that addresses automation. So, from that, it was the Presiding Judge Lamorena at the time, where there was a task force formed or one of the grant requirements was to form a task force. So that task force actually was the Criminal Justice Automation Commission. So, this Commission was composed of all the law enforcement entities plus BSP, plus at the time it was the



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Department of Administration data processing, and then we also had entities from the Department of Revenue and Tax, Guam Behavioral health. It just started expanding and that's kind of how this all started. So really the four primary entities are the Judiciary, DOC, AG, and the courts. So those are the four primaries, and then the other entities that are involved are actually, they help contribute to the information for the plan. And it's actually for them to access the system, but not necessarily to contribute to the system. Does that make sense?

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: It very much does. It said in your testimony, Associate Judge Maraman, that you mentioned here the reasoning or you want to codify this Commission... I'm trying to find that section where I'm quoting it. In your testimony, you stated that codifying the Commission into statute would allow the Commission to apply for grant funding. Can you elaborate on this, and what type of grants will the Commission be able to apply for?

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: As we all know the world of federal grants is in an upheaval right now. When we originally did this legislation there were definite programs, we could avail ourselves of. At this point it would be very difficult to say what's available. The Bureau of Planning has always stayed on top of these things and directed our efforts to get the funding when we needed it. And then we've also expended it properly and accounted for the funding.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: So, Lola, by codifying it, I think you might have mentioned something that we would be able to avail ourselves of grant funding.

LOLA LEON GUERRERO, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF STATISTICS & PLANS (BSP): Yes, I think for me, there are opportunities. Right now, there are some challenges out there with federal funding, but I believe that by codifying the Commission, there is funding available that can be explored to apply for this effort.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, well, thank you for that.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: I might mention in the past the Judiciary was sort of the pass through and acquired a lot of the equipment through our procurement division that was placed in other agencies. The

computers and other equipment they needed. So, like the fingerprints, I think it is the latest, the fingerprinting equipment's the latest thing we did.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Danielle, do you want to say?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: In addition to the equipment that we work with BSP on and in whatever grants we apply for at the Judiciary through our Court Programs Office that we administer, we also provide personnel. For example, as the Justice mentioned, the Guam police department, we have personnel there that are entering critical criminal data such as firearms identification, state identification, all of the information that is critical to utilizing this system. So, we do, when we can, avail of any grant opportunity to support this system. But as Lola mentioned, to create a solution that's going to work for all of law enforcement and those outside who need access to that information, and the legislature has acknowledged that having funded the contributing agencies over the years, we need to be able to sustain those efforts locally and to the extent that we can seek the assistance of any federal grant, we have in the time that I've been at the Judiciary and with BSP on board and whatever grants we can apply for, we definitely do. And we ensure that the other agencies, such as the Department of Corrections, upgrading their systems, the blue check devices for the police officers to have in their vehicles, the training that we provide to the law enforcement on how to utilize the system, we continue to the law enforcement on how to utilize the system we've continued to do those things.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Thank you for that information well other than that I think I'm done with my questions and I do plan on letting all the other agencies those potentials who want to, new members, to let them know that this comes with a cost. I don't know if you were familiar with that when you wrote the testimony in support of it. I'm pretty sure if you did, you would have tagged on the last part, you know, please help us provide funding so that we can be a part of this membership. We will be sending out additional information to these agencies and letting them know what the cost is. But other than that, thank you so much for answering my questions and at this time I'd like to go ahead...

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: I don't think if we provide information to more agencies that will increase the cost. For example, Parks and Rec comes on board, their cost primarily is two computers in their office, and that's all they need to pay for.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Right, but the \$458,000 for FY26...



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KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: That's for the people that put the data into the system. Parks and Rec doesn't put data in the system.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, so they wouldn't contribute into any of this.

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: Again, that's a legislative decision.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Exactly...

KATHERINE MARAMAN, ASSOCIATE JUSTICE, SUPREME COURT OF GUAM: But I don't think it would be necessary to change how we do it now.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Right so we definitely have to find some funding for this because I don't think... Danielle, did you say that you incorporated the \$458,000 in your budget for the Judicial?

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: If we?

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: ... requested it in your budget.

DANIELLE ROSETTI, ADMINISTRATOR OF THE COURTS, GUAM JUDICIARY: Yes, but across the four contributing agencies. So again, it's the agencies that currently contribute the data. Like Park Police is not going to contribute data. To get access to the system, they would need to just have their computer equipment because they don't contribute a fund. I mean they don't pay in to use this to access it, and the same thing with CPS. But because the vendor that we work with... interfaces the system with, for example, the Department of Corrections case management system, the Judiciary's case management system. So, there's technical support that is provided for the contributing agencies, for the agencies that are listed in the bill that are not providing the data. And the vendor that we currently work with will not, they're not, tying it into their case management system. It's just giving them access.

SENATOR TELO T. TAITAGUE, CHAIRPERSON: Okay, thank you. Thank you for clarifying that. But I think it is going to cost. So, we have to find some way to find this funding. Other than that, Senator Gumataotao?

SENATOR SHAWN GUMATAOTAO: Thank you, Madam Chair. I just have a couple of questions, but I think that, Lola, you said that, and this is the same testimony that was given by the Office of Homeland Security. They said, about the procedure issue. So, I know Joe had made, I mean, he basically on the record talked about the FBI's, their rules, which is bible. Are you asking for us in the legislation to add a provision to codify these procedures, do you think?

LOLA LEON GUERRERO, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF STATISTICS & PLANS (BSP): So, I'm not an IT person, I'm not too familiar with how it's all processed. I'm just thinking just to make sure there's consistency, security, and seamless integration across all criminal justice technology. Because basically we have four different platforms, four different systems and it's this, I'm going to call it a switch which is the piece that pulls the data from the four different entities that kind of forms the rap sheet, the criminal history record that the agencies access. So, as long, I mean, Frank is there. Frank is the co-Chair. Joe did clarify. I don't know about the inner. I just wanted to make sure that there is that consistency, security, and there's going to be that seamless integration.

SENATOR SHAWN GUMATAOTAO: And why I ask that is because if it is, I'm hoping that, you know, we have... I know Danielle was sitting in the back and then she had to step forward. So, we'll be looking for your help if there is any change in the statute. For this particular bill, that we'll just make sure we just add it, if there is any such thing on a time frame even. But that's why I was asking, because I know Joe was pretty clear about the process and some of the procedures that are in play and very familiar with that. So, if we are going to add it up, we just want to make sure that we do cover it in any change in this particular markup. Also, one other thing, if I could, Madam Chair, is, and we'll work with the Committee, is to add perhaps the annual reporting requirement to the Office of the Governor. We can slip it in there, and again, we'll be working with the Judiciary and the Committee in the Markup process to make sure we add that one provision if we could.

And I think to address the concerns of Therese- if it's going to help with the foster families, it might be basically what BOSSA is doing. And thank you BOSSA for your service to the people of Guam. It would be just adding maybe perhaps as a user versus someone else and I think we would we can work that through maybe the Commission once we get this legislation to this on the session floor and passed that one of its first things might be to maybe address the foster family's issue because I think that's an important distinction. And so, those are my only concerns, Madam Chair. And again, we'll work with you and our friends from our sister

III. FINDINGS & RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee finds that Bill 110-38 (COR) aims to codify the Criminal Justice Automation Commission in Guam law. CJAC was established in 1993 to improve access to critical criminal justice records and enhance law enforcement capabilities on Guam. The Commission has operated informally since 1993, improving access to criminal justice records, guiding advancements such as the court's case management system, island-wide fingerprinting system, and technology integration in police vehicles.

Both oral and written testimony on the bill was received, as follows:

- Associate Justice Katherine Maraman emphasized CJAC's role in improving officer safety, streamlining criminal justice processes, and ensuring reliable access to critical information.
- Colonel Joseph Leon Guerrero highlighted the importance of automated systems like NCIC and VCCH for law enforcement decision-making and

officer safety, confirmed compliance with FBI security policies and regular audits to ensure system integrity.

- DPR Chief Joey Terlaje supported the bill for its potential to enhance public safety, reduce redundancies, and modernize criminal justice infrastructure.
- BSP Director Lola Leon Guerrero from provided historical context and stressed the need for statutory recognition to secure funding and ensure system stability. BSP recommended establishing procedures to ensure consistency, security, and seamless integration across all criminal justice technology platforms, and an annual report to the Governor and Legislature detailing activities, challenges, accomplishments and initiative to enhance the criminal justice automation.
- Director Theresa Arriola from DPHSS underscored the bill's impact on Child Protective Services, particularly in accessing timely criminal justice data for investigations and foster family placements.
- DOC Major Antone Aguon read written testimony from DOC Director Fred Eugene Bordallo Jr., supporting the bill for its role in sustaining and developing criminal justice system data.
- Guam Homeland Security recommended adopting National Security standards for Criminal Justice Information Systems, such as those established by the FBI.
- Bill 110-38 (COR) also received testimony in general support from the Guam Police Department, Guam Behavioral Health & Wellness Center, Customs and Quarantine Agency, and the Marianas Regional Fusion Center.
- Additional comments were submitted in writing by Dannielle Rosette, Administrator of the Courts to the bill sponsor in response to the sponsors draft amendments.

Chairperson Taitague inquired about the potential costs to additional CJAC members, if they would need to contribute financially to the system's operation, stemming from the annual cost of running the system, which was estimated at \$458,000 for FY26, up from \$364,000 in FY25 due to the loss of grant funding.

Dannielle Rosette, Administrator of the Courts clarified that agencies contributing data to the system, such as DOC, GPD, and OAG, are responsible for sharing the costs. However, agencies like Parks and Recreation, which do not contribute data but only access the system, would not necessarily need to contribute financially. Associate Justice



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Maraman stated that the decision on funding contributions from non-data-contributing members would be a legislative policy decision.

A Committee Markup meeting was held on May 21, 2025. In consideration of all concerns and recommendations submitted to the Committee, Bill No. 110-38 (COR) was amended, as follows:

- § 16102 (a) was amended to be appropriately reflect the designations of additional members, that functions as departments and instrumentalities of the Government of Guam:

§ 16102. Commission Duties and Responsibilities. The Commission shall have the authority to:

(a) Manage, operate, and maintain the collection, warehousing, and timely dissemination of criminal justice information to departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of the Government of Guam as authorized by the Commission.

- § 16102 (e) was amended to add language to ensure that rules and procedures relative to data integrity, consistency and interoperability are prioritized:

(e) Develop and adopt rules and procedures to govern its conduct and operations, and to provide for data integrity, consistency, and interoperability amongst all information technology platforms. The rules and procedures shall include, but are not limited to, policies which support seamless data sharing, regular implementation of technology updates, and robust cybersecurity measures.

- A new § 16102 (g) is recommended language from the JOG, added in response to the recommendation from BSP to include a reporting requirement to update on the Commissions plans to enhance and improve interagency collaboration and integration of the Guam CJIS:

(g) Submit a written report no later than May 1st of each year to I Maga'hågan Guåhan and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan summarizing the Commission's activities, accomplishments, challenges, and plans to enhance interagency collaboration and improve

the integration of Guam's criminal justice information systems. The report shall also include information regarding associated costs and interagency agreements related to criminal justice data-sharing infrastructure.

Since its establishment, the Commission has worked to develop an automated infrastructure that has significantly improved accessibility to accurate records contained within Guam's criminal justice information system. While the Commission has effectively operated for many years with the Chief Justice of Guam or his or her designee serving as its Chairperson and with contributing members from the Guam Police Department, the Office of the Attorney General, the Department of Corrections and the Judiciary of Guam, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to codify the Commission, which shall ensure the Commission's continued operation and provide it with the stability it requires as a permanent entity.

Section 2. A new Chapter 16 is *added* to Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

9 (c) An agency head under (b) may designate a person from within his or her

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I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that for the past three decades, the Judiciary of Guam has utilized its resources and served as the island's designated Criminal Justice Systems Agency. In this capacity, the Judiciary manages the island's connection to the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and oversees the submission of all criminal and civil fingerprint records to the FBI, as well as the maintenance of Guam's criminal history repository.

I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the Criminal Justice Automation Commission was first established in 1993 to oversee Guam’s criminal justice information system but never formalized in statute. Since its establishment, the Commission has worked to develop an automated infrastructure that has significantly improved accessibility to accurate records contained within Guam’s criminal justice information system. While the Commission has effectively operated for many years with the Chief Justice of Guam or his or her designee serving as its Chairperson and with contributing members from the Guam Police Department, the Office of the Attorney General, the Department of Corrections and the Judiciary of Guam, it is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to codify the Commission, which shall ensure the Commission’s continued operation and provide it with the stability it requires as a permanent entity.

Section 2. A new Chapter 16 is *added* to Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated to read as follows:

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§ 16102. Commission Duties and Responsibilities.

§ 16100. Definitions.

(a) “Commission” means the Guam Criminal Justice Automation Commission.

(b) “Criminal justice information” means all criminal justice information system data. The term includes: criminal history record information; biographic

Comments on Bill No. 110-38 (COR)

Bill No. 110-38 proposes to add a new Chapter 16 to Title 5 of the Guam Code Annotated, relative to codifying the Criminal Justice Automation Commission to provide access to accurate and current criminal justice information through an efficient Criminal Justice Information System. The Bill outlines 1) the terminology relative to the Commission, Criminal Justice Information, and the Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS); 2) the establishment of a Criminal Justice Automation Commission and the members involved in the oversight of Guam's Criminal Justice Information System; and 3) the duties and responsibilities of said Commission.

The proposed legislation primarily seeks to regulate and formalize the statutes relative to the Criminal Justice Automation Commission to ensure its continued operations and stability as a permanent entity. Additionally, the Bill specifies that no member of the Commission shall receive any compensation for the performance of duties associated with membership in this Commission. The potential fiscal impact should this legislation become enacted may occur in the adoption of new applications, databases, platforms, and maintenance of the CJIS. However, absent comment from the Office of Technology, the Bureau is unable to determine any specific fiscal impact of Bill No. 110-38 at this time.
