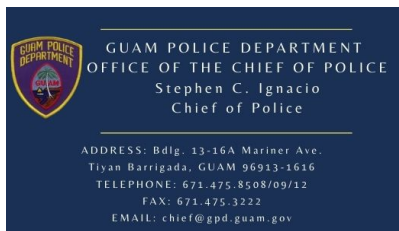

MISSION STATEMENT

The Guam Police Department exists to serve the community by protecting life and property; by preventing crime; by enforcing the laws; and by maintaining order for all citizens.

Central to our mission are the values that guide our work and decisions, and help us contribute to the quality of life on Guam.

Our values are characteristics or qualities of worth. They are non-negotiable. Although we may need to balance them, we will never ignore them for the sake of expediency or personal preferences.

We hold our values constantly before us to teach and remind us, and the community we serve, of our ideals. They are the foundation on which our policies, goals, and operations are built.

In fulfilling our mission, we need the support of citizens, elected representatives and island officials in order to provide the quality of service our values commit us to providing.

We, the men and women of the Guam Police Department, value: Human Life, Integrity, Laws and Constitution, Excellence, Accountability, Cooperation, Problem Solving, and Ourselves.

OUR HISTORY

On August 14, 1905, Guam's first true local policing effort was established under the control of the United States Navy. The first policemen were natives of Guam. These brave and heroic men were members of the Insular Patrol Force as part of the Guam Insular Guard. The U.S. Navy later augmented the police force with members of the U.S. Marine Corps stationed on Guam.

In 1952, the Department of Public Safety was established as a carryover from the U.S. Government-controlled Guam Insular Guard. The 1950 Organic Act of Guam paved the way for Guam's self-government and the formulation of the Government of Guam. The Department of Public Safety was entrusted with the authority to enforce the laws of the territory and federal statutes applicable to Guam. Furthermore, the Department was responsible for the administration and operation of the former Guam Penitentiary and Fire Division.

Effective March 13, 1985, pursuant to Public Law 17-78, the Department of Public Safety was separated into two departments - the Guam Police Department and the Guam Fire Department.

OUR DEPARTMENT

The Guam Police Department's organization structure is comprised of the Office of the Chief of Police and four key bureaus: Operations, Investigations, Forensic Science, and Services. The Operations Bureau manages day-to-day law enforcement through the Highway Patrol, Special Operations, and four (4) precincts across two (2) districts, ensuring regular patrols for public safety. The Investigations Bureau focuses on specialized criminal, juvenile, narcotics, and domestic violence investigations, with personnel also assigned to federal task forces. The Forensic Science Bureau handles crime scene processing and evidence management, while the Services Bureau oversees administrative support, including training, records, and vehicle management. This decentralized structure ensures a comprehensive and organized approach within our law enforcement organization, with each bureau specializing in a crucial aspect of police work.

WHAT WE DO AND WHO WE SERVE

Pursuant to Chapter 77, Title 10 of the Guam Code Annotated, commonly known as the Enabling Act, the Guam Police Department is established within the Executive Branch of the Government of Guam as the premier law enforcement agency. The department is granted the authority to Protect Life and Property; to Enforce the Law; to Prevent Crime; to Preserve the Peace; to Arrest Violators; to Serve the Public; to Conduct Searches and Seizures; Perform Duties of a Peace Officer; and to Enforce all laws relating to the Operation of Vehicles on Public Roadways.

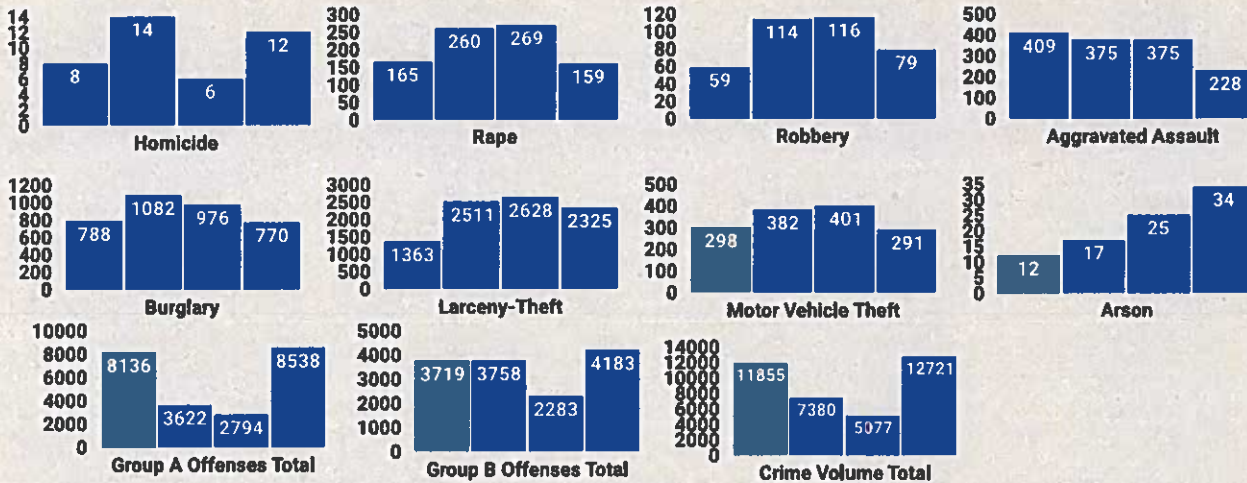

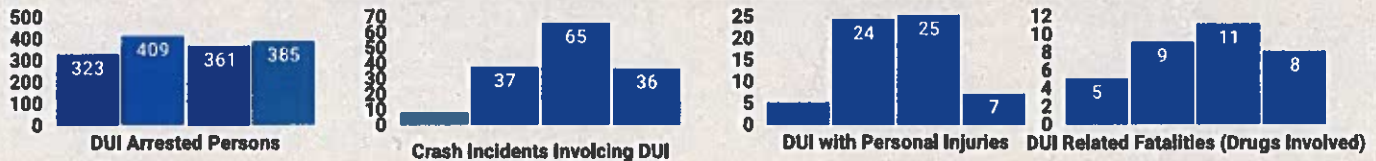

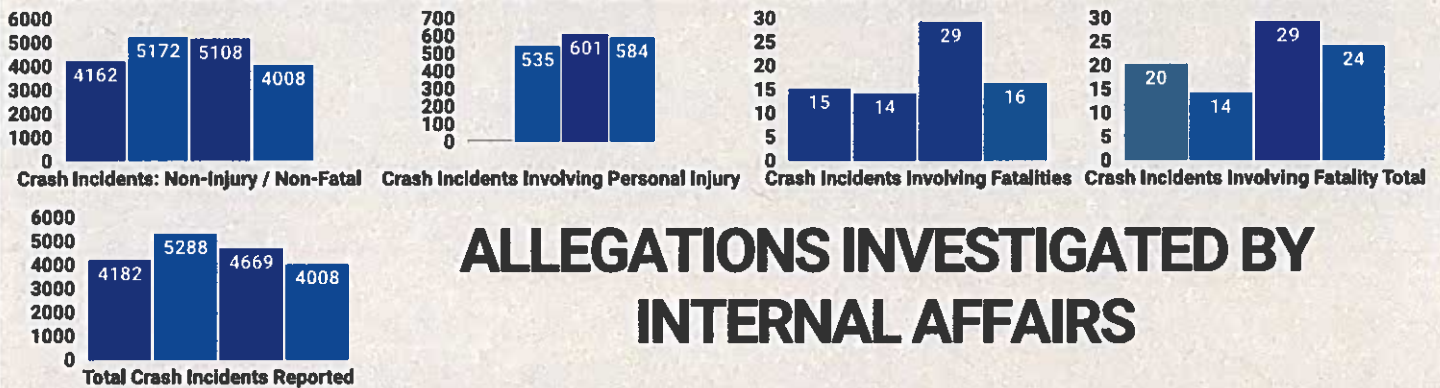
TRENDS: CRIMES REPORTED TO POLICE

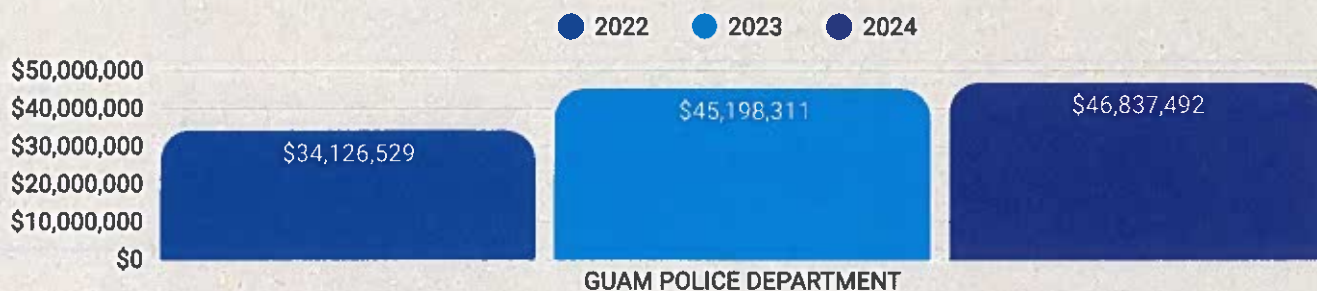


EXONERATED: The incident complained of did occur, but was lawful and proper.

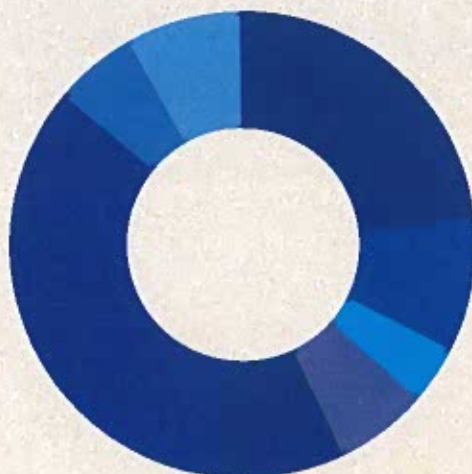

OVERALL FISCAL BUDGET

The Fiscal Year 2024 budget for the Guam Police Department supports the continued delivery of essential public safety services while maintaining a focus on accountability, efficiency, and community engagement. FY24 funding is structured to sustain core operations and advance key priorities, including community engagement, organizational effectiveness, interagency and community partnerships, standardized policies and procedures, enhanced outreach, and operational capacity.

Budgeted resources are directed toward strengthening internal processes, supporting training and professional development, and maintaining both sworn and civilian staffing levels necessary for effective service delivery. Investments in operational enhancements ensure personnel are equipped to address modern policing demands while maintaining consistency, fairness, and professionalism across departmental functions.

Overall, the FY24 budget reflects a strategic allocation of resources intended to promote public safety, reinforce collaboration with community stakeholders and partner agencies, and ensure the Guam Police Department remains responsive to current and emerging needs while operating in a transparent and fiscally responsible manner.

HIGHLIGHTS

The FY 2024 budget for the Guam Police Department is dedicated to strategically bolstering and significantly enhancing its personnel capacity across both sworn and civilian positions. Utilizing a robust combination of local and federal funding, the number of Police Officer Trainee (POT Cycles) will continue to increase at an accelerated rate. This expansion, coupled with the Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve (CVPR) Program, will provide a critical and substantial avenue to increase police presence and visibility throughout our community, ensuring proactive and stronger public safety engagement. Furthermore, with respect to assets and resources, the department has strategically procured mission-critical, cutting-edge equipment and new vehicles to comprehensively support and modernize all patrol and investigative operations. The ultimate objective remains to fully staff and outfit all personnel to sustain optimal and adequate resources for consistent, effective, and efficient departmental operations.

FUTURE OUTLOOK

The future-outlook of the FY2024 budget for the Guam Police Department is decisively focused on achieving sustainable, long-term growth, maximizing operational efficiency, and significantly enhancing community engagement. By aggressively recruiting more sworn officers and essential non-sworn employees, the department is strategically positioned to not only meet the increasing demands for public safety but also effectively address and mitigate workforce attrition. The strengthening of the Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve (CVPR) program is a key priority, expected to build even stronger community relationships, thereby fostering a critical foundation of trust and cooperation. Major investments in our vehicle fleets, technology, and comprehensive infrastructure modernization are projected to deliver immediate and substantial improvements in response times, a significant reduction in long-term maintenance costs, and a substantial enhancement of officer safety.

Furthermore, improvements to working conditions and professional standards will inevitably boost morale and retention rates, ensuring our officers have continuous access to the best tools and support necessary for their vital work. Finally, the department is proactively positioning itself to master future challenges, such as cybercrime and effective response to natural disasters, through continuous, advanced training and cutting-edge technological upgrades. Overall, the FY2024 budget firmly lays the foundational groundwork for a more highly efficient, modern, and deeply community-focused police force.
