The codification of the Criminal Justice Automation Commission represents a significant step forward in enhancing Guam's criminal justice capabilities. Established over 30 years ago, the Criminal Justice Automation Commission has diligently worked to develop an automated infrastructure that has significantly enhanced accessibility to accurate records within the system. Despite its effective operation for many years, with the Chief Justice of Guam or their designee serving as Chairperson and contributing members from various government agencies, the Commission remains an unincorporated entity.

Bill 110-38 codifies the Commission, ensuring its continued operation and providing it with the stability it requires as a permanent entity, formalizing collaboration amongst and between law enforcement, courts, and social service agencies, ultimately resulting in strengthened protocols and timely, accurate data sharing. Furthermore, it adds accountability and transparency through mandated public meetings and public reporting, and as a statutorily created entity, opens opportunities for securing grants that may further modernize our local criminal justice system.

For these reasons, I sign Bill No. 110-38 (COR) into law as *Public Law No. 38-53*.

AN ACT TO *ADD* A NEW CHAPTER 16, TO TITLE 5, GUAM CODE ANNOTATED, RELATIVE TO CODIFYING THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE AUTOMATION COMMISSION.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:

- 2 Section 1. Legislative Findings and Intent. I Liheslaturan Guåhan finds
- 3 that it is in the best interest of the people of Guam that criminal justice agencies and
- 4 the Judiciary of Guam have access to accurate and current criminal justice
- 5 information through an efficient criminal justice information system.

1	I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that for the past three decades, the
2	Judiciary of Guam has utilized its resources and served as the island's designated
3	Criminal Justice Systems Agency. In this capacity, the Judiciary manages the
4	island's connection to the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and oversees
5	the submission of all criminal and civil fingerprint records to the FBI, as well as the
6	maintenance of Guam's criminal history repository.
7	I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds this arrangement has provided law
8	enforcement agencies and criminal justice personnel with access to critical
9	information necessary for investigative functions and officer safety, particularly
10	benefiting local agencies without independent infrastructure or technical capacity.
11	I Liheslaturan Guåhan further finds that the Criminal Justice Automation
12	Commission was first established in 1993 to oversee Guam's criminal justice
13	information system but never formalized in statute. Since its establishment, the
14	Commission has worked to develop an automated infrastructure that has
15	significantly improved accessibility to accurate records contained within Guam's
16	criminal justice information system. While the Commission has effectively operated
17	for many years with the Chief Justice of Guam or his or her designee serving as its
18	Chairperson and with contributing members from the Guam Police Department, the
19	Office of the Attorney General, the Department of Corrections and the Judiciary of
20	Guam, it is the intent of I Liheslaturan Guåhan to codify the Commission, which
21	shall ensure the Commission's continued operation and provide it with the stability
22	it requires as a permanent entity.
23	<b>Section 2.</b> A new Chapter 16 is <i>added</i> to Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to
24	read as follows:
25	"CHAPTER 16
26	CRIMINAL JUSTICE AUTOMATION COMMISSION
27	§ 16100. Definitions.

5	(a) 'Commission' means the Guam Criminal Justice Automation
6	Commission.
7	(b) 'Criminal justice information' means all criminal justice

9	information; biographic data; biometric data; identity history; person,
10	organization, property, or Division of Motor Vehicles data; case or incident
11	history; firearms, and other data necessary for authorized agencies to make
12	hiring decisions, perform their mission, and enforce the laws of the Territory.
13	(c) 'Criminal Justice Information System' or 'CJIS' means the
14	computer hardware, software, and communication network which is managed,
15	operated, and maintained by the Commission for the collection, warehousing,
16	and timely dissemination of criminal justice information to authorized
17	agencies.
18	§ 16101. Establishment of Criminal Justice Automation Commission
19	and Membership. There is hereby established the Criminal Justice Automation
20	Commission (Commission), which shall oversee Guam's Criminal Justice
21	Information System (CJIS).
22	(a) Commission Leadership. The Commission shall be co-chaired

25	(2) the Chief Technology Officer of the Executive Branch of

4	§ 16102. Commission Duties and Responsibilities. The Commission
5	shall have the authority to:
6	(a) Manage, operate, and maintain the collection, warehousing, and
7	timely dissemination of criminal justice information to departments, agencies,
8	and instrumentalities of the Government of Guam as authorized by the
9	Commission.
10	(b) Develop and maintain a process to determine if and how changes
11	to existing criminal justice applications impact the CJIS. Changes to criminal
12	justice applications, databases, platforms or business processes that have an
13	impact on the integrated network must be coordinated through and approved
14	by the Commission.
15	(c) Develop appropriate policies to address privacy and civil liberty
16	concerns related to the sharing of data, data management, and retention.
17	(d) Recommend any legislation necessary for the implementation,
18	operation and maintenance of the CJIS.
19	(e) Develop and adopt rules and procedures to govern its conduct
20	and operations, and to provide for data integrity, consistency, and
21	interoperability amongst all information technology platforms. The rules and
22	procedures shall include, but are not limited to, policies which support
23	seamless data sharing, regular implementation of technology updates, and
24	robust cybersecurity measures.
25	(f) Perform all functions necessary to carry out the duties of this
26	Chapter.

(g) Submit a written report no later than May 1st of each year to I
Maga'hågan Guåhan and the Speaker of I Liheslaturan Guåhan summarizing
the Commission's activities, accomplishments, challenges, and plans to
enhance interagency collaboration and improve the integration of Guam's
criminal justice information systems. The report shall also include
information regarding associated costs and interagency agreements related to
criminal justice data-sharing infrastructure."

Section 3. Effective Date. This Act shall become effective upon enactment.
